PART 1: LEARNING JOURNEYS TO UNDERSTAND SINGAPORE'S CULTURE & DIVERSITY



The **Geylang Adventures trail** is led by Cai Yinzhou, Singapore's Youth Awardee 2017. Adventurers will traverse through the red-light district of Singapore, encountering first-hand, a multi-sensory narrative of the ecosystem of Geylang. Linked with stories of his experiences growing up, embracing and interacting with this complex community, Yinzhou hopes to spark discussions about how we may create inclusive communities amidst complex environments and policies.



As a nation that's home to a wide range of cultures, ethnicities and religions, Singapore's diversity is our strength. Our resident ethnic makeup predominantly comprises the Chinese, Malay, Indian, Eurasian and Peranakan (Straits-born people of Chinese and Malay/Indonesian heritage) communities. Our many communities may have their own festivities, traditions and practices, but Singaporeans have learnt to live peacefully in harmony, and celebrate each other's strengths.

In the tensions in our complex world today, the **Harmony in Diversity Gallery** aims to promote the importance of building interfaith peace in a religiously diverse society. Through this immersive and engaging platform, we hope to demonstrate the centrality of religious harmony to Singapore's continued development.



Tourist Hotspot, Indian Food Haven, Conservation District...and also the scene of a shocking Riot that broke out in Dec 2013. **Little India** was Singapore's first riot in 40 years. Police cars and an ambulance were set ablaze. Around 400 Indian migrant workers were involved. It was a scene no one thought they'd ever see in Singapore. Now, the mess and scorch marks on the road are gone. But the riot left indelible marks on Little India that are still visible today. What are they? And how are they changing this ethnic district? We take you off the tourist trail, and into the world of Little India. Explore the lesser known spaces, hidden communities and conflicts only insiders see.



The **Asian Civilisations Museum** is devoted to exploring the rich artistic heritage of Asia, especially the ancestral cultures of Singaporeans. Opened in 1997 and in its present building by the Singapore River since 2003, the museum traces its roots to the Raffles Museum, founded in the middle of the 19th century. ACM focuses on the many historical connections between the cultures of Asia, and between Asia and the world. Singapore's history as a port city that brought people together from all over the world is used as a means of examining the history of Asia. Special exhibitions bring magnificent objects from around the world to our Singapore audience.



Join our **Singapore Hawker Learning Journey** to have a taste of our rich culinary heritage. The Hawker Culture in Singapore is an integral part of the way of life for Singaporeans, where people from all walks of life gather at hawker centres to dine and bond over their favourite hawker food, which are prepared by hawkers. Over the years, this unique combination of food, space and community has evolved into a microcosm of Singapore's multicultural society, with stalls selling Chinese, Malay, Indian and many other diverse types of dishes.



Many of these hawker dishes originated from the food cultures of different immigrant groups who settled in Singapore. Over time, they have evolved to become the distinctive local dishes that we love, and form an important part of our food heritage.

PART 2: LEARNING JOURNEYS TO UNDERSTAND SINGAPORE'S JOURNEY AS A LIVEABLE CITY

Beyond aiming to be a smart nation, Singapore has urgent needs to be a resilient and liveable city. Combine limited natural resources, a rapidly ageing population, a consumerist culture and gentrification – what is Singapore's story of development, and how may Singapore continue to grow sustainably?



How does Singapore manage its limited water resource?

Water demand in Singapore is currently about 430 million gallons a day that is enough to fill 782 Olympic-sized swimming pools, with homes consuming 45% and the non-domestic sector taking up the rest. By 2060, Singapore's total water demand could almost double, with the non-domestic sector accounting for about 70%. By then, NEWater and desalination will meet up to 85% of Singapore's future water demand.

- a) PUB NEWater is a system that processes used water into potable water to meet Singapore's growing water consumption needs scale to facilitate Singapore's water self-sustainability. Visit the **NEWater Visitor Centre** to learn about this cutting-edge water technology.
- b) **The Sustainable Singapore Gallery at Marina Barrage** provides an overview of Singapore's commitment to sustainable development. The 1,600 square metre Sustainable Singapore Gallery is divided into six zones which trace Singapore's sustainability journey. Besides water sustainability, the gallery also explores other environmental challenges that Singapore is tackling today.



How may strategic urban planning & transport management build a liveable city?

In a tiny country like Singapore, how do you plan what and where to build? Visit the **Singapore City Gallery**, which showcases Singapore's efficient land-use planning, thus becoming one of the most liveable cities in Asia. It tells Singapore's development story in the last 50 years, through more than 40 interactive and immersive exhibits that detail our planning challenges and the innovative solutions that tackle them.

Participate in an amazing race through our neighbourhood, where you will take a ride on our buses and trains, as well as explore Singapore's **ride-hailing companies** (e.g. *Grab and Gojek*), and discover our **bike-sharing operators** (e.g. *SG Bike*).



How may Singapore enable food sustainability and resilience?

Visit the world's first eco-friendly, water-driven, rotating **vertical farm** in Singapore. Plants are placed and grown in vertically inclined structures in order to minimize the amount of land needed for farming.

The amount of food waste generated in Singapore has increased by about 40 per cent over the past 10 years and is expected to increase with our growing population and economic activity. Meet a young Singaporean start-up tackling **food waste** in commercial kitchens, such as restaurants and hotels.

OTHER OPTIONAL HIGHLIGHTS OF SINGAPORE



Inscribed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2015, the [Singapore Botanic Gardens](#) has a history of over 150 years since its founding in 1859; that's more than a century older than modern Singapore itself!

Its most popular attraction is the National Orchid Garden, which houses thousands of orchid species known as Very Important Plants (VIPs). Over 200 hybrid orchids in this garden have been affectionately named after visiting foreign dignitaries such as Nelson Mandela, the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge as well as celebrities like actors Jackie Chan, Zhou Xun and Bae Yong Jun.



Panoramic views of the forest and the thrill of walking at 25 metres above ground are all part of the experience when you traverse the **Tree Top Walk**, a 250-metre-long freestanding suspension bridge. See first-hand the layers of the rainforest, from the ground all the way to the canopy and the emergent layer of trees, when you take on this scenic seven-kilometre-long roundtrip to the bridge.



Located next to Marina Reservoir, **Gardens by the Bay** offers breath-taking waterfront views. This multi-award winning horticultural destination spans 101 hectares of reclaimed land, and is made up of two main areas—Bay South Garden and Bay East Garden.

Underlying the concept of Gardens by the Bay are the principles of environmental sustainability. Much effort was made to plan and design for sustainable cycles in energy and water throughout Bay South Garden. The Gardens lake system also incorporates key ecological processes and functions as a living system. It acts as a natural filtration system for water from the Gardens catchment and provides aquatic habitats for biodiversity such as fishes and dragonflies.



Enjoy an up-close look at mud lobsters, tree-climbing crabs and monitor lizards when you stroll along the 500-metre-long boardwalk of the mangrove swamps in **Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve**. The boardwalk runs parallel to the Wetland Centre. Turn your views to the sky when you head to the Migratory Bird Trail just a short walk away. From behind the five hides, two platforms and the 18-metre-tall Aerie Tower featured along the trail, you can quietly observe migratory birds such as the Common Redshank and Pacific Golden Plover that shack up in this reserve from September to March. Kingfishers, herons and egrets also visit the reserve regularly. But don't just read the signboards that are placed around the reserve, hear about the wildlife from certified nature guides during the free guided walks, held every Saturday at 9.30am.

ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR DENNIS LEE 李宝华



李宝华副教授于 2013 年春季加入汕头大学。他目前身兼多职，他是汕大商学院助理院长，同时也负责教授战略管理、非营利组织管理、全球企业管理、国际商务、管理学概论和中国经商课程。他也是至诚书院的导师、汕头大学创行(一个社会创业项目)的教师顾问以及汕头大学触式橄榄球协会的教练兼负责人。

此外，李教授目前也是哥本哈根商学院（CBS）的客座教授。自 2017 年起李教授在哥本哈根商学院国际暑期大学课程（ISUP）教授“全球化战略管理”和“管理非营利组织- 原则与实践”课程。他是“亚洲企业家和可持续发展期刊”的编辑，也是国际质量教育基金会（IQEF）的亚洲区主席。他的研究重点包括社会企业家精神、社会企业发展及中国的管理和营销。他于 2018 年 12 月 4 日受委为新跃社科大学（SUSS）研究员，并于 2019 年 2 月 1 日成为跃大服务学习和社区参与资源小组的会员。

除了热心教育，李教授在建筑，零售，酒店，非营利和教育部门等领域也有所贡献。他曾担任代表 40 多个国家的赛扶 (SIFE) 亚洲区域副总裁，现称为 ENACTUS。他 also 曾担任新加坡政府成立的新加坡国际基金会（SIF）执行副主任以及新加坡基督教青年会的董事会成员。李教授曾是新加坡政府成立的重组新加坡委员会成员，负责审查 21 世纪新加坡的战略，以及是新加坡全国青年理事会设立的新加坡青年奖咨询委员会的成员。在联合国开发计划署（UNDP）的支持下，李教授担任中国国际经济技术交流中心（CICETE）的顾问及中国人口福利基金会（CPWF）的名誉顾问。他的个人和职业使命是“为即将到来的一代做好迎接世界的准备”。
